costuming

- ponytail w scrunchie or hair tie
- some elastic headbands, some tied out of colorful, stretchy athletic tape
- one zip-up jacket
- sports bras
- giant soccer backpacks w Adidas and "Charlotte Soccer Academy" logos ((contain water, shin guards, ball, phone, headphones, charger, socks, cleats, deodorant))
- cleats, shin guards, socks
- SHIRTS by Nike, from past tournaments, facility logos, or plain black tee
- a couple wrist braces, one knee brace (Melanie can't wear her ankle brace)
- most wearing earrings, some rings
- bracelets (watches, hair ties, rubber)
- all legs shaved
- girls enter practice in shorts, sneakers, & baggy sweatshirts w hair up

-should captain wear a watch?? Armband??

GAME RULES

- NO JEWELRY ALLOWED (earrings, bracelets etc could get caught & yanked to injure players)
- armband exception in high school ?

scenery

- turf enclosed by black net on sides/above (think batting cage)
- framed jerseys around waiting room
- waiting room grey wall, just 2 plain white tables with 4 chairs each in lounge, small window to view field, huge flat screen on wall, motion sensor, fire alarm, thermostat, clock
- hard concrete and stone floors
- huge pic/wall backdrop of stadium crowd
- girls keep their belongings in a locker room (off-field)

from Melanie's practice

- some smiles among players, mostly serious
- air of cohesive seriousness, focus with interludes of laughter, joking
- unquestioning obedience/respect for coach (how did the coach earn this respect?)
- tends to be more talking when coach turns away
- girls have their go-to drill groups, or more proximity/time of arrival-based?
- coach provides plenty of approval, encouragement

- coach demonstrates drill with one girl, about 2 reps
- girls smile more when they have less precision on harder drill at first, laugh off embarrassing miss-kicks ((but they get more serious and more accurate as drill progresses))
- coach has man bun
- girls line up alongside to rotate thru drill without being told where or how to do so
- always jog into position when it's your turn
- swift side steps to travel (never look away from the action)
- coach removes his pullover halfway thru
- 3 parents half watching, half on phone
- one girl peeps head in waiting room seemingly to find parent, quickly sighs and turns back to field (no help here)
- 7 on 7, blue and yellow pinnie/pinney/pinny scrimmage
- girls tend not to ask questions or talk back to coach
- coach uses big arms to gesture toward locations on the field he's referencing
- wordlessly points in direction of whose possession it is (is he pointing toward that team's goal or the goal they're trying to score on?) ((he's pointing in direction the ball is meant to pursue next, so the goal being scored on))

DIALOGUE / COACH MONOLOGUE

- coach walks around during drills, calls out players by name
- uses colloquial phrasing ("let's get the rebels without a cause in the center")
- "...and hold" (to pause drill, take breather)
- "ready, steady, play!" to begin drill
- brief murmured "sorry," "you're fine" when kick misses partner (constantly weathering moments of embarrassment, but no time to get caught up in it)
- "you're doing (X), and that's okay, but what does it mean for (Y)? which foot should you use for (Z)? if i want to go that way, what makes the most sense for the way my body's shaped?" ((kind, empathetic, not condescending))
- "play in, then we'll set that up..."
- "play on" // "play!" to start
- "take your time"
- "one thing. when i'm playing this ball here... [lays out hypothetical situation against Opponent]"
- "i don't think any of us like defending that much, let's be real."
- "you're not gonna want to play until she (XYZ)... keep the traffic clear for you"
- "remember those combinations in both places"
- coach's voice gets louder to get more emphatic and enthusiastic, but not mean (echoes)
- "game's more efficient when you take more touches, more accurate"
- "touch, play, touch, play!"
- "take a breather, get a quick sip of water. if you do not have shin guards go put them on" (one girl apparently doesn't have them, so coach says to see if anyone else has any to borrow)
- -"all right, come on girls" (to end water break)

- "...and time. change it up, grab a different color" (to reset scrimmaging)
- "girls, how big is this space? not very big. freeze. [so they stop playing] [proceeds to give lecture about being quicker etc]"
- "ball here." (so someone gives him the ball)
- "get your angle, get your angle"
- "closure, closure!" (not to give up on play)
- girls call to each other during scrimmage (speaking quickly, breathlessly) using names or "here!"
- "play! ...one nothing, c'mon keep playing, keep playing!"
- "what was the difference between the two teams that allowed yellow to hold the ball longer than blue? anyone?" "use all of your space!"
- "c'mon, keep working, c'mon, c'mon"
- "all right girls, as i continue to watch, and over these last two games...."
- "RELAX on the ball. don't go as frantic and fast as possible. try to keep the ball, VALUE the ball."
- "okay MOVE girls! it doesn't have to move forward. keep the ball to create chances"
- *loud thud* "Okay, blue ball. Are you all right?" *faint 'yeah' in response*
- (after team powwow) "okay get out of here girls. great job, i'll see you next week"

HEALTH

● Emphysema

- **Emphysema** is one of the diseases that comprises COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease). Emphysema involves gradual damage of lung tissue, specifically thinning and destruction of the alveoli or air sacs.

- The GOLD system measures your breathing air volume (FEV₁) as compared to normal predicted breathing and designates your breathing into one of **four** COPD **stages** are: **Stage 1** or Mild (80% of normal) **Stage 2** or Moderate (50-80%) **Stage 3** or Severe (30-50%) emphysema.
- Cigarette smoking is the major cause
- Not curable, but there are treatments to manage it
 - Bronchodilators. These drugs can help relieve coughing, shortness of breath and breathing problems by relaxing constricted airways.
 - Inhaled steroids. Corticosteroid drugs inhaled as aerosol sprays reduce inflammation and may help relieve shortness of breath.

● Do periods really “sync”?

- ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT

- Causes of injury
 - Suddenly slowing down and changing direction (cutting)
 - Pivoting with your foot firmly planted.
 - Landing awkwardly from a jump.
 - Stopping suddenly.
 - Receiving a direct blow to the **knee** or collision, such as a football tackle.
 - Soccer, basketball, football, downhill skiing all common causes
- Symptoms
 - A loud "pop" or a "popping" sensation in the knee

- Severe pain and inability to continue activity
 - Rapid swelling
 - Loss of range of motion
 - A feeling of instability or "giving way" with weight bearing
- Risk Factors
 - Being female — possibly due to differences in anatomy, muscle strength and hormonal influences
 - Participating in certain sports, such as soccer, football, basketball, gymnastics and downhill skiing
 - Poor conditioning
 - Wearing footwear that doesn't fit properly
 - Using poorly maintained sports equipment, such as ski bindings that aren't adjusted properly
 - Playing on artificial turf surfaces
- Period of recovery: within 12 months
 - **First Aid:** If your injury is minor, you may only need to put ice on your knee, elevate your leg, and stay off your [feet](#) for a while. You can reduce swelling by wrapping an ace bandage around your knee. Crutches can help to keep [weight](#) off your knee.
 - **Medications.** Anti-inflammatory drugs can help to reduce swelling and pain. Your doctor may suggest over-the-counter medications or prescribe something stronger. For intense pain, your doctor may inject your knee with [steroid](#) medication.
 - **Knee brace.** Some people with a damaged ACL can get by with wearing a brace on their knee when they run or play sports. It provides extra support.
 - **Physical therapy.** You may need this a few days a week to get your knee back in working order. During your sessions, you'll do exercises to strengthen the muscles around your knee and help you regain a full range of motion. You may be sent home with [exercise](#) to do on your own.
 - **Surgery.** Your doctor may tell you that you need this if your ACL is torn badly, if your knee gives way when you're walking, or if you're an athlete. A surgeon will remove the damaged ACL and replace it with tissue to help a new ligament grow in its place. With physical therapy, people who have surgery can often play sports again within 12 months.
- Eating disorders

- TREATMENT
 - **A mental health professional**, such as a psychologist to provide psychological therapy. If you need medication prescription and management, you may see a psychiatrist. Some psychiatrists also provide psychological therapy.
 - **A registered dietitian** to provide education on nutrition and meal planning.
 - **Medical or dental specialists** to treat health or dental problems that result from your eating disorder.
 - **Your partner, parents or other family members.** For young people still living at home, parents should be actively involved in treatment and may supervise meals.

- **Spreading Colds**

- Sore throat and runny nose are usually the first signs of a cold, followed by coughing and sneezing. Most people recover in about 7-10 days. You can help reduce your risk of getting a cold: wash your hands often, avoid close contact with sick people, and don't touch your face with unwashed hands.
- Adults have an average of 2-3 per year (kids have more)
- Viruses spread through tiny droplets in the air that are released when a sick person sneezes, coughs, or blows their nose.

- You can get sick if you touch your nose, eyes, or mouth after you have touched something contaminated by the virus, such as a toy, countertop, or doorknob. Viruses can live on those objects for up to 2 days.
- If you come in contact with cold or flu germs, your chance of getting sick isn't 100%. It depends on when the other person was infected, and how many viral particles are contained in the droplets.
- People are most contagious during the first 2 to 3 days of a cold. A cold is most often not contagious after the first week.
- People who have the flu may pass it on to others 1 day before symptoms start and up to 5 to 7 days after getting sick, so they may spread the flu before they even know they are sick.

- Women in Soccer

- Some historians mention casual competitions in Scotland and parts of England of soccer matches between married and unmarried women during late 19th century.
- One of the popular records of the game comes from the Boxing day in 1920, at Goodison Park in Liverpool. A spectacular game took place on England's biggest soccer ground where Dick, Kerr Ladies played with a Lancashire team called St. Helen Ladies in front of a crowd of 53,000 people. It is noted that more than ten thousand fans had to be locked out when the ground became fully occupied. The crowd size on that day was seen as a major threat at the headquarters of Football Association in London. In 1921, the influential central body of the game **set a ban on women for playing soccer for an incredible period of 50 years.** The repercussions could be seen immediately as this decision crippled women soccer players in a few countries. However, Italy and France established women's leagues in early 1930s. Women soccer remained latent until World War II. After the war, the graph took an upward turn with Italy establishing its national association in 1950 and Germany organizing the first informal women European championship in 1957. Northern European countries were also part of the development, especially Norway and Sweden.
- **Maribel Margaret Hamm-Garcia** (born March 17, 1972) is an American **retired** professional soccer player, two-time Olympic gold medalist, and two-time FIFA Women's World Cup champion. Hailed as a soccer icon, she played as a forward for the United States women's national soccer team from 1987–2004.
- **Briana Scurry** = 1st black female and goalkeeper to be elected to the National Soccer Hall of Fame on Aug 3, 2017.
- Women's football was added to the official **Summer Olympic program in Atlanta 1996**. (No age restrictions for participation, whereas men must be under 23!)
- Soccer demographic is from when a contract is first signed (namely 17 years old), through the playing career and membership continues long after a playing career has ended. This is particularly important in football as the average career is 8 years, and the **average retirement age for a player is 35 years old.**
- [National Women's Soccer League](#) founded 2012 as successor to Women's Professional Soccer (2007-2012), successor to Women's United Soccer Association (2001-2003).

- History of Soccer

- As the sport developed, more rules were implemented and more historical landmarks were set. For example, the penalty kick was introduced in 1891. FIFA became a member of the International Football Association Board of Great Britain in 1913. Red and yellow cards were introduced during the 1970 World Cup finals. More recent major changes include goalkeepers being banned from handling deliberate back passes in 1992 and tackles from behind becoming red-card penalties in 1998.

- Olympic Development Program (ODP)

- **Philosophy:** To identify players of the highest caliber on a continuing and consistent basis, which will lead to increased success for the U.S. National Teams in the international arena.
- **Purpose:** The US Youth Soccer Olympic Development Program was formed in 1977 to identify a pool of players in each age group from which a National Team will be selected for international competition; to provide high-level training to benefit and enhance the development of players at all levels; and, through the use of carefully selected and licensed coaches, develop a mechanism for the exchange of ideas and curriculum to improve all levels of coaching.
- **Participation:** Contact your local US Youth Soccer State Association office to find out more about getting involved with US Youth Soccer ODP. You can find State

Association by clicking [here](#). Or, simply contact the US Youth Soccer National Office at nationaloffice@usyouthsoccer.org.

- **History:** In 1979, the program expanded, the organization became more efficient and multi-year plans were developed. State Associations were encouraged to develop programs which supported and worked in tandem with National and Regional programs. At the beginning of 1982 a formalized program for girls was created, with the addition of a full committee (one member from each Region). From 1982 until the present, international events for youth national teams have increased substantially and the US Youth Soccer ODP has kept pace by instituting trials and player pools for five age groups in the boys' program, and five age groups in the girls' program.
- **Selection Process:** Each State Association holds ODP tryouts on an annual basis. Age Groups and try-out dates may be different from state to state, based on seasonal and state considerations. Your first contact should be to your State Association for try-out information. Players are selected, in most states, on the basis of open tryouts. These tryouts are conducted by state association coaches who are recognized for their ability to identify and train players with superior skills. Some state associations combine scouting techniques and invitations to certain players with the open tryouts. Selection of these players is not an easy task. The state association head coach or State Coach will, in most cases, be assisted in the selection process by several other qualified coaches from the club or league level. Players are evaluated on the four components that make up a soccer player:
 - 1. Technique
 - 2. Tactics
 - 3. Fitness and Athletic Ability
 - 4. Psychological Component (attitude)

- Indoor vs. Outdoor soccer

- Space: indoor = smaller, hardwood floors or flat turf surrounded by walls
- Players: Outdoor = 11 players (1 keeper, 4 defenders, 4 mids, 2 forwards)
Indoor = 5 to 8 players (1 keeper, 2 defenders, 1 mid, 2 forwards)
- Gear: BOTH = shin guards, long socks, pair of cleats
 - Outdoor: cleats have studs on outsoles (require more traction)
 - Indoor: cleats are flat (require less traction, sometimes even sneakers)
- Rules: Indoor has NO OFFSIDES rule; both use Red/Yellow card system for foul penalty, but Indoor may utilize “time out box” (makes team 1 player short); Outdoor allows slide tackles (indoor doesn’t—small field=higher injury probability)
- Pace: Indoor is much faster, requires more tact, only keep ball 5 secs at a time
- Duration: Outdoor = 90-min game with 15 min half-time; Indoor = 60-min game with 3-min breaks between quarters and 15-min half-time
- Substitution: Indoor = unlimited substitutions, Outdoor = 3 subs for entire match

- Clubs usually provided a couple scholarships to enhance accessibility (but not many—they need money for coaches, utilities, equipment, jerseys, etc.)
- The majority of **soccer scholarships**, like those for football and basketball, are regulated by the three national college athletics associations. The NCAA, NAIA and NJCAA set limits on how many **full ride scholarships** can be offered for both male and female soccer players in any given division.

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HISTORY / PLACES

- Abu Ghraib

- prison torture

- In the era of Saddam Hussein, Abu Ghraib, twenty miles west of Baghdad, was one of the world's most notorious prisons, with torture, weekly executions, and vile living conditions. As many as fifty thousand men and women—no accurate count is possible—were jammed into Abu Ghraib at one time, in twelve-by-twelve-foot cells that were little more than human holding pits.
- In the looting that followed the regime's collapse, last April, the huge prison complex, by then deserted, was stripped of everything that could be removed, including doors, windows, and bricks. The coalition authorities had the floors tiled, cells cleaned and repaired, and toilets, showers, and a new medical center added. Abu Ghraib was now a U.S. military prison. Most of the prisoners, however—by the fall there were several thousand, including women and teen-agers—were civilians, many of whom had been picked up in random military sweeps and at highway checkpoints. They fell into three loosely defined categories: common criminals; security detainees suspected of “crimes against the coalition”; and a small number of suspected “high-value” leaders of the insurgency against the coalition forces.

- Khmer Rouge

- an ancient kingdom in Southeast Asia that reached the peak of its power in the 11th century, when it ruled over the entire Mekong valley from the capital at Angkor. It was destroyed by Thai conquests in the 12th and 14th centuries.

● Pol Pot

- Cambodian revolutionary and politician who led Cambodia as the Prime Minister of Democratic Kampuchea between 1976 to 1979.
- An attempt by Khmer Rouge leader Pol Pot to form a Communist peasant farming society resulted in the deaths of 25 percent of the country's population from starvation, overwork and executions.
- Pol Pot was born in 1925 (as Saloth Sar) into a farming family in central Cambodia, which was then part of French Indochina. In 1949, at age 20, he traveled to Paris on a scholarship to study radio electronics but became absorbed in Marxism and neglected his studies. He lost his scholarship and returned to Cambodia in 1953 and joined the underground Communist movement. The following year, Cambodia achieved full independence from France and was then ruled by a royal monarchy.
- By 1962, Pol Pot had become leader of the Cambodian Communist Party and was forced to flee into the jungle to escape the wrath of Prince Norodom Sihanouk, leader of Cambodia. In the jungle, Pol Pot formed an armed resistance movement that became known as the Khmer Rouge (Red Cambodians) and waged a guerrilla war against Sihanouk's government.
- In 1970, Prince Sihanouk was ousted, not by Pol Pot, but due to a U.S.-backed right-wing military coup. An embittered Sihanouk retaliated by joining with Pol Pot, his former enemy, in opposing Cambodia's new military government. That same year, the U.S. invaded Cambodia to expel the North Vietnamese from their border encampments, but instead drove them deeper into Cambodia where they allied themselves with the Khmer Rouge.
- From 1969 until 1973, the U.S. intermittently bombed North Vietnamese sanctuaries in eastern Cambodia, killing up to 150,000 Cambodian peasants. As a result, peasants fled the countryside by the hundreds of thousands and settled in Cambodia's capital city, Phnom Penh.
- All of these events resulted in economic and military destabilization in Cambodia and a surge of popular support for Pol Pot.
- By 1975, the U.S. had withdrawn its troops from Vietnam. Cambodia's government, plagued by corruption and incompetence, also lost its American military support. Taking advantage of the opportunity, Pol Pot's Khmer Rouge army, consisting of teenage peasant guerrillas, marched into Phnom Penh and on April 17 effectively seized control of Cambodia.
- Once in power, Pol Pot began a radical experiment to create an agrarian utopia inspired in part by Mao Zedong's Cultural Revolution which he had witnessed first-hand during a visit to Communist China.
- Mao's "Great Leap Forward" economic program included forced evacuations of Chinese cities and the purging of "class enemies." Pol Pot would now attempt his own "Super Great Leap Forward" in Cambodia, which he renamed the Democratic Republic of Kampuchea.

- He began by declaring, "This is Year Zero," and that society was about to be "purified." Capitalism, Western culture, city life, religion, and all foreign influences were to be extinguished in favor of an extreme form of peasant Communism.

- **Nuon Chea**

- Nuon Chea (his name at birth was Lao Kim Lorn) studied law at Bangkok's prestigious Thammasat University, where he became a member of the Thai Communist Party.
- Appointed Deputy Secretary of the CPK in 1960, he retained this position and his membership in the CPK's Standing Committee throughout the period of Democratic Kampuchea.
- He remained with the Khmer Rouge until reaching a deal with the Cambodian government in December 1998 that allowed him to live near the Thai border.
- Nuon Chea has been indicted and sent to trial for crimes against humanity, grave breaches of the Geneva Conventions of 1949 and genocide; offences which are defined and punishable under Articles 4,5, 6, 29 (New) and 39 (New) of the Law on the Establishment of the Extraordinary Chambers as amended on 27 October 2004.
- The charges against Nuon Chea have been separated (severed) into two trials (Case 002/01 and Case 002/02).
- The initial hearing in Case 002/01 was held from 27-30 June 2011, the substantive part of the trial commenced with opening statements on 21 November 2011, and ended with final statements on 31 October 2013. The trial judgment was pronounced on 7 August 2014.
- Nuon Chea was found guilty of crimes against humanity and sentenced to life imprisonment. On 23 November 2016, the Supreme Court Chamber quashed part of the convictions but affirmed life imprisonment for Nuon Chea in Case 002/01.
- On 16 November 2018, the Trial Chamber of the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia (ECCC) convicted NUON Chea of genocide, crimes against humanity and grave breaches of the Geneva Conventions of 1949.

Nuon Chea is alleged to be responsible, through his acts or omissions (committed via a joint criminal enterprise), for having planned, instigated, ordered, or aided and abetted, or being responsible by virtue of superior responsibility, for the following crimes committed between 17 April 1975 and 6 January 1979:

- Crimes against humanity (murder, extermination, enslavement, deportation imprisonment, torture, persecution on political, racial, and religious grounds and other inhumane acts)
- Genocide, by killing members of the groups of Vietnamese and Cham
- Grave breaches of the Geneva Conventions of 1949 (wilful killing, torture or inhumane treatment, wilfully causing great suffering or serious injury to

body or health, wilfully depriving a prisoner of war or civilian the rights of fair and regular trial, unlawful deportation or unlawful confinement of a civilian).

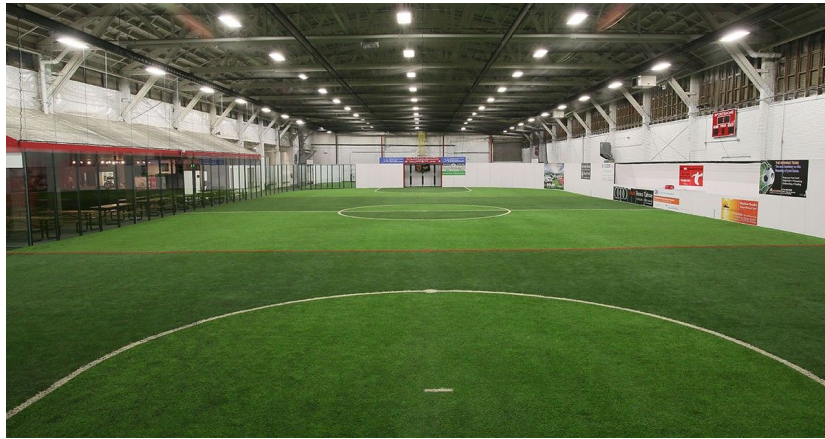

- Common brands: Plan B One-Step, EContra Ez, ella, My Way, Next Choice One Dose, Take Action, After Pill, Aftera
- Morning after pills use progestin to stop ovaries from releasing an egg. It's most effective if taken within 72 hours (3 days) after unprotected sex, but continues to be effective up to 5 days to help prevent pregnancy. Effectiveness decreases over time, so it's better to take sooner than later.
- 85-90% effective within 72 hours
